OUR APPROACH TO CHILD WELL-BEING

World Vision is a child-focused, community based, Christian organisation. Achieving the well-being of children is at the heart of our programming.

Through our work in the priority sector areas of water, sanitation and hygiene; livelihoods and economic empowerment; health and nutrition; social accountability; child protection and education, we strive so that children - especially the most vulnerable are:

- **Enjoying good health;**
- **Educated for life;**
- **Cared for, protected, and participating;**
- **Experiencing the love of God and neighbour.**

In our development approach, we are committed to making a long-term impact in the communities we serve. Through our area programme model, we are present in communities for a minimum of 15 years. This long-term commitment enables holistic, sustainable transformation over time

We partner with communities and governments towards sustainable solutions that empower families and build resilience even in the toughest of circumstances - and especially in Africa's fragile contexts and zones where the most vulnerable live.

Through VisionFund International, World Vision's microfinance subsidiary, we support parents and caregivers with livelihood programmes and financial inclusion to improve incomes that help people move out of poverty. Our work in advocacy and external engagement amplifies the voices of children and their communities to influence policy change.

Our emphasis on local staff, living and working in the communities where we serve, means that World Vision is already there when disaster strikes. In 2022, World Vision managed 12 major emergency responses, addressing the urgent needs of vulnerable communities, boys and girls affected by conflicts and climate change-related disasters across the continent.

Our Strategy - aligned across our East Africa, Southern Africa and West Africa regions - calls us to focus relentlessly on eradicating poverty in all its forms in line with the goals of the Sustainable Development Agenda and World Vision's global strategic imperatives.





LEADERSHIP & ACCOUNTABILITY

With more than 9,000 local World Vision staff members in Africa, and an additional 3,500 VisionFund Internation staff, we prioritise the safety, security and well-being of our staff members. People are our greatest asset and will remain a catalytic force in Africa long after World Vision as an organisation has completed its work.

Together, we are accountable to our stakeholders through good stewardship, robust systems, well-managed risk and transparent practices. Our esteemed Boards of Directors and Advisory Councils are highly distinguished professional Africans with a wide range of expertise in business, law, finance, education and social development, amongst others. On a continent where 42% of the population is under 15,* building a better world for African children, means building a better future for all of Africa.

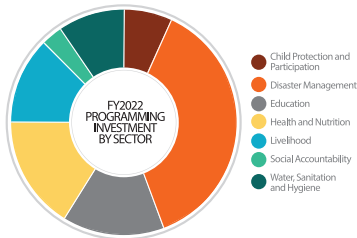
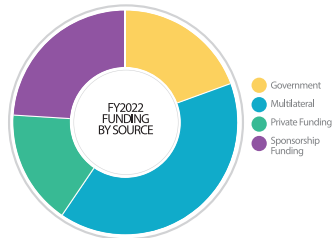
